

Graduate School Match: MBA

Standardized Testing Guide

A valid GMAT or GRE score is required to apply to the Graduate School Match: MBA and to all our graduate school partners. Tackling the standardized tests first will check that off your "to do list" and free up your time later on to work on your MBA application.

Should I take the GMAT or the GRE?

QuestBridge and our graduate school partners accept both exams. Compare the differences between the GMAT and the GRE exam content and structure below. You can also try free practice tests for each exam to see which one is a better fit.

When should I take the GMAT or GRE?

A valid GMAT or GRE test score is required at the time of your application, so plan to take the test well in advance of the application deadline(s). Test scores are valid for five years, so it's a good idea to prioritize testing as early as possible in your graduate school application process. If you are able to plan ahead, it's a good idea to take the test(s) while you are still in college and accustomed to test-taking.

At a minimum, you should allow two months to prepare for the test, with about 15 hours of studying per week. Even better would be to prepare three - six months in advance of your test date with around 10 hours per week of study time.

How can I prepare for the GMAT/GRE?

It's essential to familiarize yourself with the test structure, types of questions, and scoring process. Some applicants find a GMAT or GRE class beneficial in helping them stay on a studying schedule. There are many options available, ranging from asynchronous, online, to in-person. Some applicants are able to prepare with study materials alone. What's most important is to carve out dedicated study time and to hold yourself accountable to the plan.

How many times should I take the GMAT/GRE?

We recommend giving your full energy and dedication to preparing for the first test. However, if you're unhappy with your score and believe you can score better with more practice, you can always try again. There is no maximum number of times that you can take the GMAT or the GRE. That being said, if you do not see an improvement after taking one of the tests 2-3 times, you may want to consider switching to the other test or reallocating your time and energy to other elements of the application.



Is there a minimum GMAT or GRE score requirement?

There is no minimum acceptable GMAT or GRE score. Our graduate school partners accept students with a range of scores, and you can read about the median score ranges on their admissions websites. Your application will be reviewed holistically with testing being just one piece of the picture. Aside from testing, you can convey your academic readiness for business school through other components of your application, such as your undergraduate coursework, post-college quantitative courses, or analytical and problem-solving skills developed from work experience.

Are test fee waivers available?

QuestBridge is unable to provide test fee waivers. There may be limited test fee waivers available from MBA programs. You can inquire directly with MBA admissions offices to request one. MBA programs are eligible to receive and distribute 10 GMAT fee waivers a year. Additionally, your undergraduate financial aid office may offer GMAT or GRE fee waivers. If you are still an undergrad or recent grad, you may want to inquire with your financial aid office.
